School Fees In Arrears

For families who are currently in **arrears** for the **2024** school year and have not made an arrangement with the school, it is essential that you please attend to your account as soon as possible or to contact the office prior to **Friday**, **15**th **November 2024**.

We truly thank our families who have ensured that their child's school fees and levies have been paid or who have contacted us to put in place arrangements to suit the family budget whilst being able to access the educational services of the school.

Working together makes a huge difference to ensuring we are able to provide you and your child with the best learning, school environment and community experience possible.

Fees & Levies for 2025

Our school has much to offer and provides a very affordable Catholic education for our students.

To keep our own costs as affordable as they are, we do everything possible to maximise our resources and the grants that are made available to us.

However, the payment of the school fees and levies is what makes the biggest difference.

Without families contributing to the running costs of St Catherine of Siena, we simply could not achieve, nor do what we do.

The 2025 School Fees and Levies were presented and approved at our last School Advisory Board meeting held on Tuesday 3rd September.

The **School Family Fee** for 2025 is: **\$1,590.** This fee is billed to each family **regardless of the number of children enrolled** and provides funds for the development of learning resources as well as the maintenance of school facilities and grounds. The **Capital Levy of \$50**, which provides funds for future capital improvement projects, is included within the School Family Fee.

The **Student Levy** of **\$510** per child (Prep to Year 6), reflects the individual costs associated in engaging each child in their learning experiences and activities. The Student Levy specifically covers costs associated with book lists, curriculum and excursion expenses for each child.

The additional costs relate to the swimming and camping programs, along with technology resources.

The cost of the **Camping Program** is as follows:

Year 3: \$300 Camp Sunnystones, 13th – 14th Nov Year 4: \$300 Lady Northcote, 7th – 8th August Year 5: \$375 PBL Kynton, 8th – 10th October Year 6: \$375 Waratah Bay, 26th – 28th Nov

The school, through various grants, discounts the true cost of the camping program. It has been necessary to do this as camping costs are now inclusive of staffing costs, whereas in the past this was provided on a voluntary basis. Many schools, sadly, have made the decision to discontinue camping programs because of this reason.

The cost of the **Swimming Program** is as follows:

Prep: \$90 (5 session program)
Year 1: \$90 (5 session program)
Year 2: \$90 (5 session program)
Year 3 & 4: \$0 (onsite program)
Year 5 \$40 (2 day program)
Year 6 \$40 (2 day program)

The cost of the **Technology Resourcing Program** is as follows:

Prep: \$50
Year 1: \$100
Year 2: \$100
Year 3: \$100
Year 4: \$100
Year 5 \$0
Year 6 \$0

The Technology Resourcing Program Levy reflects the purchase of computer devices and associated apps that are used by such devices. After 3 years of use and payment of the Technology Resource Program, students will be provided with a new device. After 3 years of use by the student, the device will be provided to the family for private use.

Prep students are provided with an Apple I-Pad that is used to support learning throughout the year but is retained by the school.

The school is covering the cost of the Year 5 and Year 6 Technology Resourcing Levy next year and then Year 6 in 2026. This recognises the change in the provisioning of devices and that the devices, at the time of these students graduating from St Catherine of Siena will be returned to the school for reuse. All students from Prep to Year 6, from 2027, will then be billed the Technology Resource Levy.

We take pride in the fact that we are able to achieve excellent educational outcomes for our students whilst providing an affordable Catholic education.

2025 Fee & Levy Billing Dates & Payment Options

For 2025, the **Family Fee** is billed in **three (3) instalments** with the **Student Levy** being paid in full by the **10**th **March 2025**.

Family Fee \$530.00 + Student Levy + Technology
Resource Program Levy

Instalment 2: May 14 Family Fee \$530.00

Instalment 3: August 14 Family Fee \$530.00

*All other fees, e.g. Camp and Swim Program due prior to time of event

Payment Options

All school fees are due at the beginning of each billing period as per the instalment dates or as arranged with the Principal.

Parent are encouraged to contact Mrs Lisa Nolan (School Bursar) to put in place any alternative arrangement that will assist families in ensuring that the school fees are paid.

An appointment will be made for families who have not attended to their school fees to ensure that an arrangement can be put in place. Please note that all outstanding fees and levies are expected to be paid at the conclusion of a family's time at St Catherine of Siena Primary School.

We again remind families that are in financial difficulty or require assistance to please contact the school so that we are able to assist you at this time.

This Weekend's Gospel



The Blind Beggar, 1882 - Jules Bastien-Lepage

Master, grant that I may see.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

Gospel Reflection

This passage from the Gospel of Mark draws to a close a significant section of the gospel. It stretches from 8:22 to this passage, 10:52. Like other examples in the Gospel of Mark, the stories at the beginning and end of the section are related and shed light on what they surround.

Like this passage, the event at the beginning of the section is an account of the healing of a blind man. Contained within the two healings of blindness, as

we have seen over the last six weeks, is an extended lesson on discipleship.

Within this section, Jesus speaks about his upcoming death on three occasions and each time the disciples display their own form of blindness when they fail to understand what Jesus is trying to tell them quite explicitly. In this section, we have heard that discipleship involves suffering and hardship; it means placing one's own needs last and the needs of others first; and that discipleship is all about faith.

In this healing of blind Bartimaeus, we see all the hallmarks of what Jesus has been trying to teach the disciples in the preceding episodes. As a blind man, Bartimaeus would be regarded as 'imperfect' incomplete - and consequently in a permanent state of uncleanliness. He would not be allowed to live within the bounds of normal society, nor have contact with people. So it is that Jesus encounters Bartimaeus on the side of the road, outside the city walls as he is leaving Jericho. Learning that it is Jesus passing by, Bartimaeus calls on Jesus to help him and the crowd tries to shut him up and remind him of his status. But Jesus calls Bartimaeus to him and. placing the needs of the other first, asks 'What do you want me to do for you?' When Bartimaeus makes his request, Jesus announces that it his faith that has saved him and his sight is restored. Bartimaeus, like a good disciple, then follows Jesus on the road.

Scriptural context - Blindness

Blindness is a powerful metaphor that is used repeatedly throughout scripture. It is almost always a metaphor for blindness of heart or blindness of mind rather than a purely physical affliction. There are multiple accounts of healing blindness in the gospel. Saul/Paul is blinded on the road to Damascus and only has his sight restored when he is baptised. The Pharisees are described as being 'blind fools' and there the prophets make numerous references to blind seeing as a sign of the Messiah's arrival. It is a very powerful image of being 'blind' to truth and 'blind' to the teaching of Jesus.

Have you thought? On the side of the road ...

When Jesus encounters Bartimaeus he is sitting by the side of the road – a reject of society sitting off to the side as the world passes him by. There are times in all of our lives when we feel like this: hurt; ashamed; unloved; rejected; cast aside. It is at these moments in our lives that Jesus really wants to 'break through' into our experience. If we allow ourselves to hear his voice calling us to him, then we too can 'throw off our cloak' – our old life – and join him on the road.

Living the Gospel – Bartimaeus, a model?

Bartimaeus is a man who has almost nothing in life. His blindness has made him outcast and he is reduced to begging on the side of the road. When he is called to Jesus he jumps up and casts off what may well be his only real possession – his cloak. Yet what he does have in abundance is faith and hope. When asked what he wants Jesus to do, his answer may seem obvious, but his desire to see goes beyond physical sight. He asks for the sight of one who truly believes and to whom the truth of Jesus is revealed. In this way, he is a model to all who would be disciples.

Sugar Glider Project

This term, our **Year 6 ECO Captains and Visual Arts Captains** have taken part in a special environmental project, combining creativity with conservation. The students decorated nesting boxes for sugar gliders, which will soon be placed in a **Valuk Barring Park**, a **local park in Sydenham**. This will provide homes for these tiny marsupials.

Sugar gliders, native to Australia, face increasing habitat loss due to deforestation and urban development. This project gave our students the opportunity to learn about the importance of protecting local wildlife and how human activities impact the natural environment. In response, they eagerly embraced the challenge of creating safe, appealing homes for these nocturnal creatures.



Working in small groups, the students are painting the wooden boxes with bright, colourful designs inspired by nature. Along the way, students will learn about the sugar gliders' habitat preferences, ensuring their boxes are not only decorative but also practical for the gliders to nest in.

Once completed, the boxes will be installed in tall trees around the park, providing much-needed shelter for sugar gliders and encouraging them to settle in the area. Hopefully the students will also have an opportunity to visit the park after the boxes are placed to monitor their success and, hopefully, see some sugar gliders in action!



This hands-on project has been a wonderful way for students to contribute to wildlife conservation in our community while engaging their creative skills. It's been an inspiring journey, watching our young environmentalists make a real difference for local wildlife.

A new addition to the playground is the installation of two GaGa pits that will be available for Year 3 to Year 6 students in the coming weeks.

The game is incredibly fast providing the opportunity for as many students who want to play to get a go.



Most of our families would be unfamiliar with this game so to provide a little insight into how it is played, we are publishing the following.

Please note that the base of the GaGa pit is that of sand, so it might find its way into your washing machine – just a little heads up!

Players start inside the GaGa pit and touching a side wall (For safety reasons, we will be allowing 8 students only at a time to commence the game.)

One player throws the gaga ball up in the air towards the middle of the pit. On each of the first two bounces, players yell "Ga" as the ball hits the ground, then it is in play for anyone to hit ("Ga-Ga-Go").

- 1. Players can hit the ball with one hand but cannot pick it up and throw it.
- 2. If the ball touches a player anywhere on or below the knee, that player is eliminated. This is regardless of who touched the ball last sometimes a player gets themselves out by mistake!
- 3. A player cannot touch the ball two times in a row the ball must first touch another player or the pit wall or it is called a "double touch" and that player is out. Note that players can "dribble" the ball off the wall as many times as they want to setup their next shot as long as it touches the wall each time.
- 4. Players may not kick the ball since this means touching the ball below the knee.
- 5. If the ball is hit out of the pit, then the last player to touch the ball is out.
- 6. Players who are out must leave the GaGa pit immediately.
- 7. The last player out is the winner and gets to start the next game. (If it seems to be taking too long for the last two players to end the game, the players waiting outside the pit can count down from 20 to end the game in a tie).
- 8. Also, catching the ball in the air eliminates the person who hit it.
