2025 Sacramental Program

A distinctive mark of a Catholic school is the emphasis on community – principals, teachers, staff and parents working together and with the wider community to educate and develop the whole child: emotionally, academically, physically, socially, and spiritually.

By choosing St Catherine of Siena Primary School, your child is nurtured in an environment which engages with the Gospel teachings as well as participating in the parishes Sacramental program.

Next year's **(2025)** Sacrament dates have been confirmed and we are communicating this early in order for you to ensure that you are prepared and informed well in advance.

All children enrolled at St Catherine of Siena, who have received the Sacrament of Baptism, will have the opportunity to celebrate three sacraments during their primary school years. These are:

- The Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation (Year 3)
- The Sacrament of First Eucharist (Year 4)
- The Sacrament of Confirmation (Year 6)

The following outlines the school's Sacramental Program.

Sacrament Enrolment Evening

All families who have a child, that has been Baptised and, is in Year 3, 4 or 6 and wishes for their child to receive the following sacrament **MUST** attend a Sacrament Enrolment Evening. This will be held on **WEDNESDAY FEBRUARY 19th**, **2025**, at **7pm**.

This night provides parents/guardians a brief overview of the sacraments and what is the school, parish and as parents are expected to do in preparing your child in receiving the sacrament.

On this night you will be asked to submit a Sacrament Enrolment Form which will be provided to you at the beginning of the school year.



Sacrament of Reconciliation

- Penance Family Night held on February 25th, 2025, at 6:30pm.
- Penance Presentation and Commitment Mass held on March 8th, 2025, at 6pm.
- Sacrament of Penance held on March12th, 2025, at 7pm.

- The Sacrament of First Eucharist Family Night held on May 13th, 2025, at 6:30pm.
- The Sacrament of First Eucharist Presentation and Commitment Mass held on May 24th, 2025, at 6pm.
- The Sacrament of First Eucharist held on May 31st, 2025, at 11am and 1pm.

• Sacrament of Confirmation Family Night held on August 5th, 2025, at 6:30pm. Sponsors will also be required to attend this night.

• Sacrament of Confirmation Presentation and Commitment Mass held on August 9th, 2025, at 6pm.


• Sacrament of Confirmation held on August 16th, 2025, at 11am and 2pm.

Aspire leadership

On Wednesday the 13th of November all of the Year 5s got to experience an incursion lead by 2 members of the UPP team. Their names were Gil and Alana. In the morning we started with a slideshow, this slideshow was about being a leader without a badge. This was an exciting part of our day. This part had lots of activities with our BFFT, which stands for Best Friend For Today. Some of the tasks were challenging and some were fun. When we got told to partner up, we all chose our friends, then we got split up with people we have barely ever talked to.



After snack we straight away went to the hall to continue our learning of being a leader for Year 6. When all the classes came to the hall and sat in the learning space, Gil and Alana our UPP instructors, told us about the word A.S.P.I.R.E Aspire is what we were focused on in the middle sessions of the day.

The word A.S.P.I.R.E has a meaning for each letter. The first letter is for Action, S meaning Serve, P for Persist, I for Influence, R for Respect and E for Encouragement.

These words had a big impact on us for the day of course but also for us to keep at in the yard, outside of school and more.

As well as learning about A.S.P.I.R.E, for the whole middle block, all the year 5s got to participate in something called the 'Epic Race', which had around 11 activities being, a puzzle, a dice roll, a pyramid stack with cups (eyes closed), an egg and spoon, and other amazing activities. But before we got to experience these things, all the Year 5s were split into 12 groups consisting of 6-7 people we weren't really friends with. We all really enjoyed doing these activities as they taught us heaps, helped us learn great life skills with tea, and other great qualities.



After the epic race and lunch break, we started learning about **Prophet**, **Planner**, and **People Leaders**, also known as **PPP**.

A Prophet Leader comes up with ideas to make something better than it is at the present moment, a Planner Leader uses the idea from the Prophet Leader, and structures it. And a People Leader is basically "in control" of making sure everyone has a great, fun time, enjoying whatever the Prophet and Planner Leader created.

Once we learnt about PPP, all of the Year 5 classes used strategies to fit through a hula hoop as quickly as possible. 5C class were very fast, we finished in 29 seconds, then when we tried again, we beat our score finishing with 26 seconds. Our strategy was using groups to fit through the hula hoop, 5B's strategy was hopping through the hoop one by one, and lastly, 5A went from legs to head. But originally we thought that it was a race, then Gil said it wasn't a competition, it was actually a race to beat our original score.

This Weeks Gospel Is That Of The Readings In Two Weeks Time. The School Has Brought Forward The Teaching Of Advent To Ensure That We Are Able To Do So In The School Time Provided.

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke 21:25-28. 34-36

Your redemption is near at hand.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'There will be signs in the sun and moon and stars; on earth nations in agony, bewildered by the clamour of the ocean and its waves; men dying of fear as they await what menaces the world, for the powers of heaven will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. When these things begin to take place, stand erect, hold your heads high, because your liberation is near at hand.

'Watch yourselves, or your hearts will be coarsened with debauchery and drunkenness and the cares of life, and that day will be sprung on you suddenly, like a trap. For it will come down on every living man on the face of the earth. Stay awake, praying at all times for the strength to survive all that is going to happen, and to stand with confidence before the Son of Man.'

Gospel Reflection

We are, perhaps, used to thinking of the season of Advent as a time of preparation for the celebration of Christmas. But this week's readings, and the readings of the next few weeks, remind us that the notion of preparation extends well beyond the celebration of the birth of Jesus. We are reminded that we are, in fact, living in an 'in-between time'. From this week's first reading we are reminded that the expectation of a Messiah was a very longstanding hope for Israel. The coming of the Messiah would usher in a new prosperity and a divine reign of God. The earliest Christians began to see that the ancient prophecies could all be applied to Jesus and they began to regard Jesus as the promised Messiah - the fulfilment of prophecy. However, Jesus also promised that he would come again, and the expectation of the first followers of Jesus was that his return would be in their lifetime. In our second reading from the letter to the Thessalonians,

we can see the growing realisation that perhaps Jesus' return will not occur within the current generation. This realisation had a dramatic effect on the life and faith of the community. Imagine living with the belief that the end of time was going to occur not just in your lifetime but literally any day now. Slowly, they realised that Jesus' words were not that specific and the time of return had not been identified. What Jesus had called for was a state of readiness, a state of preparedness. This didn't mean he was coming immediately; what it meant was that there was need to get the house in order because he would be coming at some time. Advent is a time to remember that we still haven't really got the house in order.

Scriptural context

This week's gospel passage comes from a lengthy passage in the gospel of Luke in which Jesus speaks extensively about the future. It is a very different style of writing from the usual narrative, teaching and parable forms that make up most of the gospel. The style is an echo of the prophetic writings of the Old Testament. Compare this passage with this week's first reading of other passages from the writings of the prophets. The style is always rich in metaphor and symbol. There is a grandness about the style. We know, just from the use of language, that great things are afoot!

Have you thought? - Waiting, waiting, waiting ...

I'm not a big fan of waiting! Anticipation is pretty good; getting prepared and getting ready are OK, too. But when is comes down to being all dressed up and ready to go, I'm just hopeless at waiting. If Advent is a time of pointless waiting for Christmas then we've somehow missed the message. Rather than just waiting, Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation. But it's not just about anticipating Christmas. That's part of it, sure. However, Advent is about reminding ourselves that we have a job to do: preparing for the reign of God – in our lives and in our world.

Different View - We're doomed!

Fundamentalists love readings like this week's apocalyptic gospel passage. Full of portent and urgency, it inspires the sort of thinking that says, 'Repent now, because you could be dead tomorrow!' It is easy to look at a passage like this and apply it to the conditions of the world today: everything's going to rack and ruin; it's just as the Bible foretold; the end of the world is just around the corner. But we have to remember that this was written nearly 2,000 years ago! Yes, there is still urgency! Yes, there is still need for change! But we still have time to get it right.
