POSITIVE BEHAVIOUR LEARNING

We are a Positive Behaviour for Learning School. PBL is all about teaching children the right behaviour, just like we teach any other subject at school.

"If a student does not know how to read, we teach
If a student does not know how to swim, we teach
If a student does not know how to multiply, we
teach

If a student does not know how to behave, we teach."

Toward the later part of last year, after much consultation and reflection, we were able to publish the values that staff, student and parents chose as the core foundation to our school's culture and to use Positive Behaviour Learning as the mechanism by which these core values are expressed and lived out. A reminder to us all is that the purpose of introducing Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) and identifying these core values is to: Support all students to succeed socially, emotionally and academically every day.

The core values at St Catherine of Siena Primary School are:

Respectful Safe Kind Responsible

These four values were voted highly in both the parent survey and staff poll.

A Behaviour Matrix has been established to create clear and achievable behaviour expectations within a variety of areas throughout the school and across all year levels. The Behaviour Matrix will ensure that there is a consistent approach to behaviour within the school.

A copy of the Behaviour Matrix is included in this newsletter edition.

Sitting beside the Behaviour Matrix are two further documents. The first is a Behaviour Management

Flow Chart that instructs staff in how behaviour is to be managed, the second is a document that outlines what a MINOR & a MAJOR behaviour is.

A copy of the Behaviour Management Flow Chart is shown below on the following page.

Next Thursday, staff will meet to finalise what are considered **MINOR & MAJOR** behaviours. MINOR being those behaviours managed by the teacher and MAJOR behaviours managed by leadership. Once finalised, this will be shared and communicated with the community.

The next stage in our PBL journey is to create mascots that can be used to assist us in remembering the values of Respectful, Safe, Kind & Responsible.

Each classroom will explore what a mascot is and why they are used. We will then ask students who are interested to enter a competition to create mascots that can be used to market the PBL values within the school. The student or students who create the winning images will be awarded with a \$50 kids voucher that can be used at either Smiggle, JB-Hi Fi, Rebel and many other stores. The lucky winner or winners will also get the opportunity to work with a graphic artist to turn their images into professional artwork which will be used across the school as part of the displays that will reinforce the positive behaviours we are seeking to encourage and develop as part of our learning behaviour.

We encourage all students to have a go and get involved in the competition. Please note that students can work independently, with their siblings, or in a pair with a friend.

The student **PBL Mascot Competition Template** will be handed out by the classroom teachers at the end of next week, but that doesn't mean students can't begin drafting their entry for the competition.

To ensure a fair process, all students interested in entering, will be given a blank template to draw their image on. Each entrant will be given a number as we will not have student's names attached to the images to ensure that the voting on the image is about the image and not who has drawn it.

Entries close on **Monday 17**th **March 2025** and must be submitted to **Mrs Anderson via the classroom office tubs**.

Once all entries have been received, the PBL team will shortlist the entries. We look forward to sharing the winning image with you next term.

the student individually and explain the reason behind this using the PBL matrix and expectations.

Step 4

If the behaviour occurs again during the same day, write an ODR which the teacher hands into the office at the end of the day.

If a child receives 3 ODR's across a week, teacher to contact parents/carers and communication with leadership.

You can practice at home by asking your child to sign their favourite colour or identify colourful objects around the house.




On Tuesday 4th March, the day before Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent, we will be celebrating Shrove Tuesday with our students.


As well as teaching the students about the history and traditions associated with Shrove Tuesday, we would like to share a pancake snack with our students.

~ Learning to be courageous and face our fears ~





This week's 2 minute experiment saw the whole school participating in learning about the special property salt has and how it makes ice melt. Students were amazed when Mr Coleiro was able to make the ice stick to the string for the whole class to see.



In Years 5 and 6, students have got stuck into the basics of programming through BeeBots.

These small, programmable robots help students develop logical thinking and an understanding of coding, as they plan and test simple commands to make the robots move. It's a hands-on way to introduce them to the world of technology.

In Years 3 and 4, students explore how technology is integrated into our daily lives. They learnt about the terms object, system and process, and how everything manmade is technology such as a peg, spoon and even a set of instructions. This learning also introduces students to engineering concepts, allowing them to understand the role engineers play in designing the world we live in.


For younger learners in Years 1 and 2, STEM focused on simple scientific concepts. Students explore the properties of materials by experimenting with objects that sink or float, developing an understanding of buoyancy and material properties in a fun, interactive way.

Even the youngest learners in prep are introduced to STEM through sensory exploration. By making and playing with playdough, they discover its unique properties, such as its texture and malleability, laying the foundation for more complex scientific thinking in later years.





On Monday, February 17th, 2025, our prep students had a special visit from paramedics Claire and Susan, providing a hands-on learning experience. The students were given the unique opportunity to sit in the ambulance, walking through its various features and asking insightful questions. They were also captivated by an engaging story, which helped them better understand the role of paramedics in the community. The day was made even more interactive when the students dressed up and used bandages to practice basic first aid skills, pretending to help in emergency situations. The Prep Team would like to express their deep gratitude to Claire and Susan for their time, knowledge and the invaluable experience they provided to the students.





















Rules of Gaga Ball

Gaga has become one of our favourite outdoor games for students from **Grade 3 to Grade 6**. Since introducing this game late last year, we have noticed some issues regarding variations to the rules being introduced that have created opportunities to argue over who is in and who is out. In response to this, the leadership team gathered last Monday night to resolve this issue.

The official St Catherine Of Siena Gaga game rules:

- All players (up to 8) start with one hand touching a wall of the pit.
- The game begins with a referee throwing the ball into the centre of the pit with the players shouting 'GA' for the first two bounces, and 'GO' on the third bounce, after which the ball is in action.
- Once the ball is in play, any player can hit the ball with an open hand.
- You can hit the ball with open hands, but picking up the ball, holding the ball and throwing it at a player is not allowed and will result in you going out.
- Hitting the ball with a closed hand or a "fist" is not allowed.
- If a ball touches a player on or below the knee (even if the player hits himself or herself) he or she is out and leaves the pit. If a player is hit above the knees, the play continues.
- If a player hits the ball out of the court, and the ball doesn't hit anybody, then the player who hit it is out.
- Players and spectators are not permitted to sit on the wall of the Gaga pit.
- When one player has eliminated all other players, the game is over and a new one may begin.
- When two players are left, a twenty second count begins. If there is no clear winner, the two players use 'rock-paper-scissors' to settle who the winner is with both players then returning to the end of the line and 8 new players to enter the pit and start the game again.

This Weekend's Gospel



The Gospel according to Luke 6:27-38

Be Merciful As Your Father Is Merciful.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you.

If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them.

And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much.

And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount.

Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.

'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate.

Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned.

Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'

HOMILY by Richard Leonard

Some years ago I was at an annual parents' dinner for a Catholic school for profoundly disabled children.

A well-known local politician, whose child was in the school, was asked to speak. This is what he said: 'I would like to pay tribute to the staff at this school. Only parents and teachers know what a joy and a heartbreak it is to have a profoundly disabled child. I always wanted the perfect child, but where is the perfection in my son David? We are told that God looked at the world and it was perfect, but my son cannot understand things as other children do. David cannot remember facts and figures as other children do. David walks with difficulty and cannot speak. How can God be filled with joy at David?' The audience was shocked by this pained question from an anguished father.

'I believe', the father continued, 'that when God allows a world in which David can now live for 50 years, perfection is found in the way people react to children like him.'

'Just recently David and I were walking in our local park. Some boys had been there most of the day playing cricket. They were serious about this competition. David was very excited and I knew he wanted to join in. David has terrible physical coordination, but I approached one of the boys on the pitch and asked if David could play. The boy looked around for guidance from his mates. Getting none, he took matters into his own hands and said "Things are tight, we have to get six runs to win but we'll try and give him a bat". David smiled broadly. After scoring three more runs the next boy got out. David was put up the batting order and called to the wicket. I helped him get out there.'

Everyone knew that it was all but impossible for my son to help them win the game. He didn't even know how to hold the bat properly, let alone hit with it. The bowler, however, sent down a soft ball so David could at least make contact. The second similar ball came and David swung clumsily and missed it. One of David's team mates came up to him and together they held the bat and faced the bowler waiting for the next ball.'

'As the ball came down, David and his teammate swung at the ball and together they hit a strong ground shot to the boundary. At his captain's urging David stumbled up the pitch as quickly as he could.

Never in his life has David run so fast. He came back for a second run as the fielder saved the ball from being four runs and so the team was screaming for a third run. The fielder could have thrown the ball to David's stumps and got him out. On the winning third run, however, he threw the ball to the other end where the other batsman was safely home. The keeper casually sent it up to David's end, just as David was completing the third, winning run.'

'That day', said the father softly with tears now rolling down his face, 'those boys showed me why God always looks at creation and knows it is very good.'

Jesus said, 'If you love those who love you, what credit is that? Be kind, be merciful, forgive and do not condemn, for the measure you give out is the measure you will receive'.
