We ended up having a huge response with over 180 suggestions. We shortened the list to the top 10 of repeated name suggestions, which the whole school then voted on.


It is with great excitement that I can announce that the names chosen are....

#### Fun Facts About Auslan

Did you know that people who are deaf use different sign languages around the world? Just like spoken languages, there are about 130 different sign languages!

In Australia, most deaf people use Australian Sign Language, or Auslan. Here are five fun facts about this special language!

- 1. Auslan is an Australian Language
- 2. Auslan was **created in Australia** by deaf people.
- 3. Instead of using sounds, Auslan uses hand movements, body movements, and facial expressions to communicate.
- 4. More than **20,000 people** in Australia use Auslan every day!
- 5. In 1991, the Australian Government said that Auslan is an **official language**, just like English!



Students expanded their vocabulary with practical, everyday Auslan signs such as "stop," "go," "sit," and "toilet." They also practiced using facial expressions to add meaning to their communication.


Try asking your child how to sign "How are you?" and practice responding with "good" or "bad."



Over the past week, students at St. Catherine of Siena have been immersed in a variety of engaging activities. The whole school had the exciting opportunity to observe a simple yet fascinating experiment: when a candle is covered by a cup with a bit of water at the bottom, the water rises into the cup as the flame goes out.



This hands-on experience sparked curiosity and led to discussions about air pressure and combustion.

Year 5/6 students focused on Bee Bots, learning about programming by designing and creating obstacle courses for the robots to navigate. This activity helped them develop problem-solving skills and understand the basics of coding.



In Year 3/4, students explored the engineering design process, where they used limited materials to create prototypes. This challenge encouraged teamwork and innovative thinking as they worked to solve design problems.



The Year 1/2 classes continued their exploration of buoyancy, building boats out of play dough to see how shape impacts a material's ability to float.



Meanwhile, the Prep classes learned about the properties of play dough, testing its strength by building towers and bridges. These hands-on activities have provided a fun and engaging way to apply STEM principles to real-world situations.

## What are School Advisory Councils?

#### Parent voice

School Advisory Councils provide a structure and a process for shared voices leading to consensus that supports 'the effective development of the strategic direction of the school' and give opportunity for parent voice and community perspective to be available to the principal and the parish priest for the good of school and parish where students' wellbeing and outcomes are paramount.

This year, St Catherine of Siena School is seeking to formalize the School Advisory Council. This means that those who wish to participate and be a member of the School Advisory Council will be formally appointed and hold specific roles within the council.

If you wish to participate as a formal member of the School Advisory Council, please read the following and email the principal (Des Noack) via principal@scmeltonwest.catholic.edu.au

expressing your wish to participate as a council member, the year levels that your child/ren are enrolled in along with a mobile number so as to make direct contact with you when organizing School Advisory Council meetings.

On **Tuesday 18<sup>th</sup> March 2025 at 7.00pm**, we hope to formalize the appointment of members to the council and communicate this to the community that week in the school newsletter.

#### What they are

School Advisory Councils:

- form part of the broader governance framework of MACS
- are a consultative, review and advisory body
- are found in all MACS schools, both primary and secondary levels
- are guided in their actions by the MACS
   Statement of Mission, and an understanding of the history of the parish, founders and school
- are a forum for parents to share their wisdom

- with, and offer support to, the principal and the strategic interests of the school
- are a sounding board for all stakeholders that provides feedback to the principal and parish priest
- are an important point of liaison with parish pastoral councils
- are avenues for parents to contribute to their children's school and build up one another
- will fit the pastoral model of each particular parish or association of parishes
- are a form of Church lay ministry
- are a means of engagement with parents that enables a fruitful participation in consultation on matters affecting the education of students

#### What they do

The following are some examples of ways the School Advisory Council may support the school and the principal:

- ensuring that, at the local level, Catholic schools remain 'actively embedded in the life of the faith communities of the local Church, which in turn is tangibly manifest in the life of each school'
- articulating and enacting the school's mission and vision, and promoting the school's Catholic ethos and culture by promoting faith formation and development
- encouraging the partnership and participation of the school, parish and wider community in the life of the school and parish
- providing advice to the principal on school improvement, school reviews, the annual school budget and other financial matters, the school master plan, capital resource planning and maintenance
- contributing to the selection process for the school principal via membership of the selection panel
- as per MACS and Victorian Catholic Education Authority Ltd (VCEA) policies and guidelines

- contributing to the panel that guides the process of principal appraisal as per MACS and VCEA policies and guidelines
- receiving reports from the principal to be informed as per requirements in various MACS and VCEA policies and guidelines
- developing processes of consultation and providing a forum for discussion and discernment, where parent voice and perspective are available to inform and support the decisions made by the principal and the parish priest for the good of school and parish where students' wellbeing and outcomes are paramount
- understanding and acknowledging that any initiative that materially affects the school's land and buildings or other areas of parish property must be approved by the parish priest, who represents their parish as the beneficial owner of the school's land and buildings
- acting within the parameters of the MACS
   Terms of Reference for School Advisory
   Councils
- producing a School Advisory Council Annual Report that acknowledges the activities, achievements and challenges of the council over the past year, and indicates goals and focus for the following year
- undertaking an annual evaluation to reflect upon its performance and areas for improvement.

#### **School Advisory Councils:**

- are not the governing body of a school
- · do not have a decision-making authority
- do not have a legal identity
- do not become involved in the day-today management of the school
- are not a forum for parent advocacy or special interest representation
- are not a parents and friends association
- are not a fundraising forum or feteorganising committee.




#### **Expectations of members**

As the School Advisory Council is not a governing body and has no canon/civil law or corporate status, its appointed members do not need to prove their status as a 'responsible person' as defined in the *Education and Training Reform Regulations*, and thus do not need to undertake the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA) fit and proper person declaration or the National Police Check.

However, council membership must be fit for purpose and composed of people who meet high standards of community, group and individual behaviour, and appreciate, value and share the educational mission and ethos of the Catholic Church.

In this light and as stated in the MACS Terms of Reference for School Advisory Councils, each member of the council will receive a letter of appointment that will require them to:

- sign the school's Child Safety Code of Conduct (available from the school)
- undertake a Working with Children Check as per the <u>Worker Screening Act 2020</u> (Vic.)
- accept the <u>MACS Code of Conduct for</u> <u>School Advisory Council members</u>.

The Gospel according to Luke 6:39-45

A Person Speaks From What Is In His Heart

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher.

Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

#### **HOMILY** by Richard Leonard

In Rome, during the 16th Century, the most famous confessor in town was St Philip Neri. Popes and paupers sought his counsel and spiritual direction.

One day a famous Duchess came to him and confessed the sin of gossip. Philip Neri told her to go home and get a feather pillow and return to the steps of the Church. Sometime later he met her there and produced a small knife. He told the noblewoman to rip open the pillow. As she did, the swirling wind in the square picked up the loose feathers and they danced around the square and down the lanes.

St Philip and the Duchess watched in silence as the feathers went everywhere. He then turned to her and said, "Now, go and collect all the feathers." To which she protested, "They have gone everywhere, I couldn't possibly find and regather them." "So too with your tongue, Madam," St Philip scolded her, "You have no idea where you gossip goes and you can never unsay it." (This is very much what happens when social media is used to maliciously.)

In today's Gospel Jesus teaches us that our words reflect the state of our hearts.

Psychologists tell us that there are three main reasons why people habitually gossip, or 'share the news' as Australian men prefer to call it: power, envy and boredom.

To know something about someone else can put us in a more powerful position with friends or colleagues. By being able to share what we have 'just heard', we are seen to be current and interesting. But this type of power is destructive because our friends normally assume that when they are absent, they are maltreated in the same way. Gossipers have more alliances than friendships.

The most malicious gossip often comes out of envy. Envious gossip often sees people make things up about others and pass it off as though it were true. The worst of tabloid newspapers, television and radio trades on this destructive vice. There is no place for the 'rumour file' in the Christian life. Sometimes, when a company or person have to deny the false accusations made about them, we get what we want – their reputations are tarnished and even their business can be in danger. No wonder medieval theologians called envy a 'deadly sin'.

Boredom, however, is a modern cause for gossip. Our relationships and the way in which we hold each other's trust and good name to be paramount, are undermined by images from the media about how exciting life should be for everyone. Scene after scene in novels, television programs and films where confidences are

betrayed, and lives are raked over for comment and intrigue fill in the boredom in our lives with a distorted portrayal of human behaviour. The more we take it in, the more we mirror it in our own conduct.

Jesus does not tell us today that there is no place for criticism, challenge, confrontation and correction in the Christian life. Just that we have the responsibility to very careful about what we say about others and how we criticise and condemn them. Jesus reminds us that most of our condemnation of others, is what we now call, "projection", where we ignore similar failings in ourselves, but roundly condemn them in others.

May this Eucharist, then, help all of us let go of the need to be powerful, the deadly sin of envy and more creative with what we do when we are bored. May it help us make better choices about how we speak, to whom we speak and what we say.

St Philip Neri knew it all too well: most times we cannot know the consequences of what we say and we can never unsay it.




#### Governance Structure of St Catherine of Siena Primary School
